A frustrated student and reluctant learner, Brian daydreamed from class to class until being introduced to poetry in third grade. Intrigued, he set on a course to explore the wonder of words.





Brian began his professional creative endeavors early, when as a fifth grader he sold a joke to a radio station in Cleveland. He earned a degree in communications from John Carroll University, and is now senior editor of the humor staff for American Greetings, one of the five largest creative divisions in the world. In addition, he has written cartoon gags that have appeared in more than 600 newspapers worldwide, published humor essays for national and local magazines and newspapers, and created many children's books, including the popular titles in his Words Are CATegorical™ series, which has sold more than 1 million copies.

As a humorist, writer, and poet, Brian P. Cleary shows kids how to play with words. He believes that humor is not only a fun way to learn, but an effective way to teach. 
